A CLOSER LOOK AT THE 2021-22 CHAMPIONS 'SMOKE'

Background

I have competed in a number of Sharpie Nationals over the years since my first nationals at Black Rock in 1992/93 sailing as forward hand with Shorty, with a second placing in the Port Kembla event in 2008/09, my most recent nationals prior to the Canberra event was the Mordiallic series in 2016/17. The Canberra nationals was originally planned to occur during the 2020/21 season however due to the COVID situation it was decided to skip a year and move it to the 2021/22 season. Both Andrew and I were heavily involved in the planning for the event at our local Canberra club, the YMCA Sailing Club, along with a small team of mostly Canberra Sharpie sailors. The COVID situation had not completely resolved, so was always a constant discussion point in the lead up to the event and we were all pretty focused on ensuring the event went off as well as we could deliver it, given it was the first time a Sharpie nationals had been held in Canberra.

The Crew

My brother Andrew has been a constant for my Sharpie sailing, whilst we both grew up racing Mirror dinghy's on Lake Burley Griffin against each other for many years, once we moved to Sharpies, Andrew started to sheet for Chris Ablett and he did that for a number of years with Dave Magill as forward hand. I moved back from Sydney in 2004, and Andrew started sheeting for me shortly after and has been pretty much on the boat since. Given our many years of collective lake sailing experience, it was great to have Andrew on the boat for the Nationals keeping his eyes out of the boat looking for the next pressure or likely wind change.

Simon Doherty has been sailing with Andrew and I for a couple of years now and has really developed his sailing in that time. Collectively we were probably not the perfect weight combination (Me - 80kg, Andrew - 65kg, Simon - 75kg) given the extremely light series that the Canberra nationals turned out to be, we sailed well and had good boat speed around the course.

The Boat

Gotta love the "SMOKE", N883. Previous national champion in the 2000 series in Brisbane when Robbie Duessen sailed it to a great win, the year after it was built. Robbie had ordered a Macca hull but had sought some expert advice from SP systems in Sydney at the time in how best to lay it up and I think it has been

a fast stiff boat ever since it was built. I purchased SMOKE from Joe Roos in 2007 and have been sailing it since that time, winning eleven NSW State Sharpie Championships. One of the things that I really like about SMOKE was that everything worked so well on the boat, however I have refined a few things over the years and gradually replaced/upgraded a number of items such as moving to a carbon pole and boom.

Preparation/planning

Probably the most important preparation that Andrew and I had done for this series in particular was the years of sailing on Lake Burley Griffin, especially learning to sail and to race competitively on inland waters in the 1980's and 1990's. Whilst not always the most exciting sailing, we raced in very light conditions for many of these seasons and this taught us patience, persistence as well as to keep your eyes out of the boat always looking for better pressure and what other boats might be doing around you to get the best advantage.

Series/Plan

Whilst we were very focused on the planning of the event overall, I don't think we had much time to really consider our sailing plan for the series. We obviously had our extensive lake sailing experience that we probably relied on heavily and as it turned out the conditions really suited us. The first day of racing was cancelled due to insufficient wind, so the first heat was not held until after the New Year. We managed to have some very strong results in the first few days which put us in a strong position coming into the last day of racing although at the time only four heats had been completed. We were leading but our nearest competition Jason Heritage (past National champion and many 2nd placings) was very close if he could drop his worst race. Final day had a delayed start but the promise of a little more wind than the other days. As it turned out the wind did finally come in with 10-15kts from the NE. We were able to hold onto some consistent placings on the final day to finish the series 6.5 points clear of Jason who sailed extremely well to finish 2nd. We used a very flat Doyle Fraser mainsail that came with the boat when I brought it in 2007 (and I think the Hobart crew that owned it before Joe had this sail made), however I did purchase a new Walker jib which I used to great effect during the series as well as a wide shouldered Walker kite which also proved useful in the not too shy courses that prevailed during the event.





Tips and Tricks

I think all previous National Champions have covered most of the go fast techniques (which I have relied on for many years for my own sailing), however I guess a couple of the more specific things that I do regularly during my lake sailing include the following:

- Do not over tighten the rig, even upwind, I usually sailed with the leeward stay just moving a little and always ensured the mast was raked all the way forward with the side stays eased on a broad reach and runs. I was probably running 25'7 or more mast rake upwind on the lightest days on the lake.
- Upwind keep the jib leach streamer flowing if possible in very light winds, don't over sheet (jib or main) or try to point too high, keep the speed up and try to get to the next pressure before other boats. Keep an eye on the jib car position as it needs to be seriously adjusted with the mast so far forward to achieve the above.
- I use very little vang in light conditions, and sometimes we don't even clip it on to allow the crew more room up front. I use a mid boom sheeting system for the main which allows for good mainsail leach control, with the original windward sheeting traveller system allowing me to bring the boom to the centreline without over sheeting the leach.
- I usually heal the boat to leeward upwind in very light air to help set the sails with the crew weight forward and try to minimise movement in the boat as much as possible. Often I would just have the sheethand and myself move sides and the forward hand just leaning each way through the roll tack.
- Most importantly, keep your eyes out of the boat and observe both the wind on the water, other boats (great wind indicators), and other indicators (Australian Parliament House flag is a great Canberra centric one) to give you the best advantage on the water.

Huge thanks to the organising committee, YMCA Sailing Club, volunteers including the Race Committee who did a great job getting the series completed in challenging conditions and the competitors both local and interstate.


Finally, have fun, don't take it too seriously and enjoy the competition!






